On July 19, 2018, at 7:00 p.m., a public hearing will be held by the Corporate Authorities of the Village of Hampshire, Illinois, at the Village Hall, 234 South State Street, Hampshire, Illinois, for the purpose of hearing and considering testimony concerning a proposed Special Service Area relating to the property legally described below which is known as the Loves Subdivision (the "Property") in the Village of Hampshire, Kane County, Illinois, the "Village"). The purpose of the Special Service Area will be to provide a back up funding mechanism for the purpose of maintaining of the stormwater facilities and open space areas proposed as part of the subdivision of the Property, said maintenance to consist of erosion controi, nuisance control and sedimentation control, sediment removal, structural maintenance and replacement, re-grading, re-seeding, re-planting, and removal of debris, as from time to time deemed necessary and appropriate (the "Services"). AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR REGULATION OF THE DEPLOYMENT OF SMALL WIRELESS FACILITIES IN THE VILLAGE

WHEREAS, the Illinois General Assembly has recently enacted Public Act 100-0585, known as the Small Wireless Facilities Deployment Act (the "Act"), which became effective on June 1, 2018; and

WHEREAS, the Act sets forth certain requirements for the collocation of small wireless facilities in Illinois municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Village is otherwise authorized to enact appropriate regulations and restrictions relative to access to and use of the public right-of-way, so long as any such enactment does not conflict with applicable State and federal law; and

WHEREAS, the Village desires to comply with the Act, and to establish certain rules and regulations concerning the deployment of small wireless facilities in the Village as otherwise allowed under the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF HAMPSHIRE, KANE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Hampshire Municipal Code as previously amended shall be and is hereby further amended to add certain new regulations concerning deployment of small wireless facilities in the Village, as Article XI: Small Wireless Facilities Deployment Regulations, under Chapter 9: Public Ways and Property, of the Code, in words and figures as follows:

See attached text of the Small Wireless Facilities Deployment Regulations

Section 2. All ordinances, resolutions and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded and waived.

Section 3. In the event that any applicable federal or State law or regulation conflicts with the requirements of this Ordinance, the wireless provider shall comply with the requirements of this Ordinance to the maximum extent possible without violating such federal or State law or regulation.

Section 4. If any provision of this Ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstances is ruled unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Ordinance that can be given effect without

the invalid application or provision, and each invalid provision or invalid application of this Ordinance shall be and is severable.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage, approval and publication pamphlet form, according to law.

CHAPTER 9

PUBLIC WAYS AND PROPERTY

ARTICLE 11

SMALL WIRELESS FACILITIES DEPLOYMENT

REGULATIONS

9-11-1. Purpose and Scope.

A. Purpose. The purpose of this Article is to establish regulations, standards and procedures for the siting and collocation of small wireless facilities to be located on rights-of-way within the Village's jurisdiction, or to be located outside the rights-of-way on property zoned by the Village exclusively for commercial or industrial use, after June 1, 2018, in a manner that is consistent with the Illinois Small Wireless Facility Deployment Act. Except as otherwise provided herein, all permits issued and agreements made for siting and collocation of such facilities after June 1, 2018 shall comply with this Article.

B. Exceptions to Applicability.

- 1. Nothing in this Article authorizes a person to collocate small wireless facilities on the following properties:
 - a) Property owned by a private party, without the consent of the owner;
 - b) Property owned or controlled by the Village or another unit of local government that is not located within rights-of-way, without the consent of the Village;
 - c) Any privately-owned utility pole or wireless support structure, without the consent of the property owner;
 - d) Property owned, leased, or controlled by a park district, forest preserve district, or conservation district for public park, recreation or conservation purposes, without the consent of the affected district, excluding the placement of facilities on rights-of-way located in such affected district that are under the jurisdiction and control of a different unit of local government as provided by the Illinois Highway Code;
 - e) Property owned by a rail carrier registered under Section 18c-7201 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, Metra Commuter Rail or any other public commuter rail service, without the consent of the rail carrier, or the public commuter rail service;
 - f) Any electric utility as defined in Section 16-102 of the Public Utilities Act, without the consent of the electric utility.
- 2. The provisions of this Article do not apply to an electric or gas public utility or such utility's wireless facilities if the facilities are being used, developed and maintained consistent with the provisions of subsection (i) of Section 16-108.5 of the Public Utilities Act.
- 3. Nothing in this Article shall be construed to relieve any person from any requirement (a) to obtain a Village franchise or a State-issued authorization to offer cable service or video

service in the Village; or (b) to obtain any required permit to install, place, maintain, or operate communications facilities in the Village, other than small wireless facilities that are subject to this Article.

- C. Pre-Existing Agreements. Any agreement between the Village and a wireless provider that relates to the collocation of small wireless facilities in the right-of-way, including the collocation of small wireless facilities on Village utility poles, in effect as of June 1, 2018, shall remain in effect, subject to applicable termination provisions contained therein, and the following:
 - 1. A wireless provider that has an existing agreement with the Village as of June 1, 2018 may accept the rates, fees and terms that the Village makes available under this Article for the collocation of small wireless facilities or the installation of new utility poles for the collocation of small wireless facilities that are the subject of an application submitted two or more years after said date by notifying the Village that such wireless provider opts to accept such rates, fees and terms in lieu of those provided for in such agreement.
 - 2. Such agreement shall otherwise remain in effect, subject to applicable termination provisions, for such small wireless facilities as the wireless provider has collocated on the Village's utility poles pursuant to applications submitted to the Village before said wireless provider provides such notice and exercises its option under this section.

9-11-2. Definitions.

For the purposes of this Article, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

- a) Act: The Illinois Small Wireless Facility Deployment Act (S.B. 1451).
- b) Antenna: Communications equipment that transmits or receives electromagnetic radio frequency signals used in the provision of wireless services.
- c) Applicable Codes: Such building, fire, electrical, plumbing, or mechanical codes adopted from time to time by the Village, including such recognized national code organization codes and/ or local amendments to such codes, including but not limited to the National Electric Safety Code.
- d) Applicant: Any person who is a wireless provider and submits an application to the Village.
- e) Application: A request submitted by an applicant to the Village for a permit to collocate small wireless facilities, or for a permit to install a new utility pole for such collocation, together with any applicable fee for the review of such application and/or issuance of such permit.
- f) Collocate or Collocation: To install, mount, maintain, modify, operate, or replace wireless facilities on or adjacent to a utility pole or wireless support structure.
- g) Communications Service: Cable service, as defined in 47 U.S.C. 522(6), as amended; information service, as defined in 47 U.S.C. 153(24), as amended; telecommunications service, as defined in 47 U.S.C. 153(53), as amended; mobile service, as defined in 47 U.S.C. 153(53), as amended; or wireless service other than mobile service.

- h) Communications Service Provider: A cable operator, as defined in 47 U.S.C. 522(5), as amended; a provider of information service, as defined in 47 U.S.C. 153(24), as amended; a telecommunications carrier, as defined in 47 U.S.C. 153(51), as amended; or a wireless provider.
- i) FCC: Federal Communications Commission of the United States.
- j) Fee: A one-time charge due under this Article.
- k) Historic District or Historic Landmark: A building, property, or site, or group of buildings, properties, or sites that are either (i) listed in the National Register of Historic Places or formally determined eligible for listing by the Keeper of the National Register, the individual who has been delegated the authority by the federal agency to list properties and determine their eligibility for the National Register, in accordance with Section VI.D.1.a.i through Section VI.D.1.a.v of the Nationwide Programmatic Agreement codified at 47 CFR Part 1, Appendix C; or (ii) designated as a locally landmarked building, property, site, or historic district by an ordinance adopted by the Village pursuant to a preservation program that meets the requirements of the Certified Local Government Program of the Illinois State Historic Preservation Office or where such certification of the preservation program by the Illinois State Historic Preservation Office is pending.
- Law: A federal or state statute, common law, code, rule, regulation, order, or local ordinance or resolution.
- m) Micro Wireless Facility: Small wireless facility that is not larger in dimension than 24 inches in length, 15 inches in width, and 12 inches in height and that has an exterior antenna, if any, no longer than 11 inches.
- n) Municipal Utility Pole: A utility pole owned or operated by the Village in a public right-of-way.
- Permit: A written authorization required by the Village to perform an action or initiate, continue, or complete a project.
- p) Person: An individual, corporation, limited liability company, partnership of any kind, association, trust, or other entity or organization.
- q) Public Safety Agency: A functional division of the federal government, the state, a unit of local government, or a special purpose district located in whole or in part within this state, that provides or has authority to provide firefighting, police, ambulance, medical, or other emergency services to respond to and manage emergency incidents.
- r) Public Utility: The term "public utility" shall have the meaning given to that term in Section 3-105 of the Public Utilities Act.
- s) Rate: A recurring charge.
- t) Right-of-Way: The area on, below, or above a public roadway, highway, street, public sidewalk, alley, or utility easement dedicated for compatible use. Right-of-way does not include Village-owned aerial lines.

- u) Small Wireless Facility: A wireless facility that meets both of the following qualifications: (i) each antenna is located inside an enclosure of no more than 6 cubic feet in volume or, in the case of an antenna that has exposed elements, the antenna and all of its exposed elements could fit within an imaginary enclosure of no more than 6 cubic feet; and (ii) all other wireless equipment attached directly to a utility pole associated with the facility is cumulatively no more than 25 cubic feet in volume. The following types of associated ancillary equipment are not included in the calculation of equipment volume for purposes of this sub-section: electric meter, concealment elements, telecommunications demarcation box, ground-based enclosures, grounding equipment, power transfer switch, cut-off switch, and vertical cable runs for the connection of power and other services.
- v) Utility Pole: A pole or similar structure that is used in whole or in part by a communications service provider, or for electric distribution, lighting, traffic control, or similar function.
- w) Village: The Village of Hampshire.
- x) Wireless Facility: Equipment at a fixed location that enables wireless communications between user equipment and a communications network, including: (i) equipment associated with wireless communications; and (ii) radio transceivers, antennas, coaxial or fiber-optic cable, regular and backup power supplies, and comparable equipment, regardless of technological configuration. Wireless facility includes small wireless facilities. Wireless facility does not include: (i) the structure or improvements on, under, or within which the equipment is collocated; or (ii) wireline backhaul facilities, coaxial or fiber optic cable that is between wireless support structures or utility poles or coaxial, or fiber optic cable that is otherwise not immediately adjacent to or directly associated with an antenna.
- y) Wireless Infrastructure Provider: Any person authorized to provide telecommunications service in the State that builds or installs wireless communication transmission equipment, wireless facilities, wireless support structures, or utility poles and that is not a wireless services provider but is acting as an agent or a contractor for a wireless services provider for the application submitted to the Village.
- z) Wireless Provider: A wireless infrastructure provider or a wireless services provider.
- aa) Wireless Services: Any services provided to the general public, including a particular class of customers, and made available on a nondiscriminatory basis, using licensed or unlicensed spectrum, whether at a fixed location or mobile, using wireless facilities.
- bb) Wireless Services Provider: A person who provides wireless services.
- cc) Wireless Support Structure: A freestanding structure, such as a monopole; tower, either guyed or self-supporting; billboard; or other existing or proposed structure designed to support or capable of supporting wireless facilities. Wireless support structure does not include a utility pole.

9-11-3. Regulation of Small Wireless Facilities.

- A. Permitted Use. Small wireless facilities shall be considered to be permitted uses and shall be subject to administrative review, except as provided below regarding Height Waiver or Exceptions, and shall not be subject to zoning review or approval if the small wireless facilities are to be collocated (i) in rights-of-way in any zoning district, or (ii) outside rights-of-way in property zoned exclusively for commercial or industrial use.
- **B.** Permit Required. An applicant shall obtain one or more permits from the Village to collocate a small wireless facility.
- **C. Process.** An application shall be received and processed, and permits issued shall be, subject to the following conditions and requirements:
 - Application Requirements. A wireless provider shall provide the following information to the Village, on an application form to be provided by the Village, as a condition of consideration of any permit application to collocate small wireless facilities on a utility pole or wireless support structure:
 - Site specific structural integrity and, for a municipal utility pole, make-ready analysis prepared by a structural engineer, as that term is defined in Section 4 of the Structural Engineering Practice Act of 1989;
 - b. The location where each proposed small wireless facility or utility pole would be installed and photographs of the location and its immediate surroundings depicting the utility poles or structures on which each proposed small wireless facility would be mounted or location where utility poles or structures would be installed. This should include a depiction of the completed facility;
 - c. Specifications and drawings prepared by a structural engineer, as that term is defined in Section 4 of the Structural Engineering Practice Act of 1989, for each proposed small wireless facility covered by the application as it is proposed to be installed;
 - d. The equipment type and model numbers for the antennas and all other wireless equipment associated with the small wireless facility;
 - e. A proposed schedule for the installation and completion of each small wireless facility covered by the application, if approved; and
 - f. Certification that the collocation complies with the Collocation Requirements and Conditions contained herein, to the best of the applicant's knowledge.
 - g. In the event that the proposed small wireless facility is to be attached to an existing pole owned by an entity other than the Village, the wireless provider shall provide legally competent evidence of the consent of the owner of such pole to the proposed collocation.
 - 2. Application Process. The Village shall process applications as follows:
 - a. The first fully completed application received by the Village shall have priority over applications received by the Village from different applicants for collocation on the same utility pole or wireless support structure.

- b. An application to collocate a small wireless facility (i) on an existing utility pole, (ii) on a wireless support structure, or (iii) for replacement of an existing utility pole or wireless support structure shall be processed on a nondiscriminatory basis.
- c. If the Village determines that applicable codes, ordinances or regulations that concern public safety, or the requirements contained in this Article require that the utility pole or wireless support structure be replaced before the requested collocation, approval shall be conditioned on the replacement of the utility pole or wireless support structure at the cost of the provider.
- d. The Village shall deny an application which does not meet the requirements of this Article, as follows:
 - i) The Village shall document the basis for a denial, including the specific code provisions or application conditions on which the denial is based, and send the documentation to the applicant on or before the day the Village denies an application.
 - ii) The applicant may cure the deficiencies identified by the Village and resubmit the revised application once within 30 days after notice of denial is sent to the applicant without paying an additional application fee.
 - iii) The Village shall approve or deny the revised application within 30 days after the applicant resubmits the application, and if it does not timely do so, the application shall be deemed approved; provided, the applicant shall have notified the Village in writing of its intention to proceed with the permitted activity on a deemed approved basis, after submittal of the revised application.
 - iv) Failure to resubmit the revised application within 30 days of denial shall require the application to submit a new application with applicable fees, and recommencement of the Village's review period.
 - v) Any review of a revised application shall be limited to the deficiencies cited in the denial. However, this procedure for consideration of a revised application does not apply if the cure requires the review of a new location, a new or different structure to be collocated upon, new antennas, or other wireless equipment associated with the small wireless facility.
- e. An application shall be deemed approved under the following circumstances: (i) If the Village fails to approve or deny the application within 90 days after the submission of a completed application; and (ii) if the applicant has notified the Village in writing that it intends to proceed with the proposed activity on a deemed approved basis no sooner than 75 days after the submission of a completed application, (iii) then the permit shall be deemed approved on the later of the 90th day after submission of the complete application or the 10th day after the receipt of the deemed approved notice by the Village. Provided however, the receipt of such deemed approved notice shall not preclude the Village's denial of the application within the time limits otherwise provided under this Article.
- f. An application to collocate a small wireless facility that proposes the installation of a new utility pole shall be processed on a nondiscriminatory basis.

- g. Such application shall be deemed approved under the following circumstances: (i) if the Village fails to approve or deny the application within 120 days after the submission of a completed application; and (ii) if the applicant has notified the Village in writing that it intends to proceed with the proposed activity on a deemed approved basis no sooner than 105 days after the submission of a completed application; (iii) then the permit shall be deemed approved on the later of the 120th day after submission of the complete application or the 10th day after the receipt of the deemed approved notice by the Village. Provided however, the receipt of such deemed approved notice shall not preclude the Village's denial of the permit request within the time limits otherwise provided under this Article.
- 3. Completeness of Application. Within 30 days after receiving an application, the Village shall determine whether the application is complete and shall notify the applicant. If an application is incomplete, the Village must in its notification to the applicant specifically identify the missing information. An application shall be deemed complete if the Village fails to provide notification to the applicant within 30 days after all documents, information and fees specifically enumerated in the Village's permit application form are submitted by the applicant to the Village.
- 4. Tolling. Processing deadlines are tolled in accordance with the following:
 - a. In the case of an incomplete application, from the time the Village sends the notice of incompleteness to the time the applicant provides the missing information.
 - b. In case of an express written agreement by both the applicant and the Village, for the agreed time; and
 - c. In case of a local, state or federal disaster declaration or similar emergency that causes the delay, for a reasonable time caused by the emergency..
- 5. Consolidated Applications. An applicant seeking to collocate small wireless facilities within the jurisdiction of the Village shall be allowed, at the applicant's discretion, to file a consolidated application and receive a single permit for the collocation of up to 25 small wireless facilities if the collocations each involve substantially the same type of small wireless facility and substantially the same type of structure.
 - a. If an application includes multiple small wireless facilities, the Village may remove small wireless facility collocations from the application and treat separately small wireless facility collocations for which incomplete information has been provided or that do not qualify for consolidated treatment or that are denied.
 - b. The Village may issue separate permits for each collocation that is approved in a consolidated application.
- 6. Means of Submitting Applications. Applicants shall submit applications, supporting information, and notices to the Village by personal delivery at the Village's designated place of business, by regular mail postmarked on the date due, by delivery service, or by any other commonly used means, including electronic mail.

- D. Pole Attachment Agreement. Within 30 days after approval of a permit to collocate a small wireless facility on a municipal utility pole the Village and the applicant shall enter into a written agreement, designated a "Master Pole Attachment Agreement," provided to the permittee by the Village for the initial collocation on a municipal utility pole. For subsequent approved applications for such collocation(s), the Village and permittee shall enter into a supplemental agreement, designated a "License Supplement," to be appended to such Mater Pole Attachment Agreement.
- E. Duration of Permits. The duration of a permitted collocation shall be for a period of not less than 5 years, and each such permit shall be renewed for an equivalent duration unless the Village makes a finding that the pertinent small wireless facility or the new or modified utility pole does not comply with the provisions of any applicable agreement, code, regulation or this Article.
- F. Repeal of Act. If the Act is in the future repealed as provided in Section 90 therein, renewal of any permit shall be subject to the applicable Village code provisions or regulations in effect at the time of renewal.
- G. Collocation Requirements and Conditions.
 - 1. Public Safety Space Reservation. The Village may reserve space on municipal utility poles for future public safety uses, for the Village's electric utility uses, or both, but a reservation of space may not preclude the collocation of a small wireless facility unless the Village reasonably determines that the municipal utility pole cannot accommodate both uses.
 - 2. Installation and Maintenance. The wireless provider shall install, maintain, repair and modify its small wireless facilities in safe condition and good repair and in compliance with the requirements and conditions of this Article. The wireless provider shall ensure that its employees, agents or contracts that perform work in connection with its small wireless facilities are adequately trained and skilled in accordance with all applicable industry and governmental standards and regulations.
 - 3. No Interference with Public Safety Communication Frequencies. The wireless provider's operation of the small wireless facilities shall not interfere with the frequencies used by any public safety agency for public safety communications.
 - a. A wireless provider shall install small wireless facilities of the type and frequency that will not cause unacceptable interference with a public safety agency's communications equipment.
 - b. Unacceptable interference will be determined by and measured in accordance with industry standards and the FCC's regulations addressing unacceptable interference to public safety spectrum or any other spectrum licensed by a public safety agency.
 - c. If a small wireless facility causes such interference, and the wireless provider has been given written notice of the interference by the public safety agency, the wireless provider, at its own expense, shall as soon as practicable remedy the interference in a manner consistent with the abatement and resolution procedures for interference with public safety spectrum established by the FCC including 47 CFR 22.970 through 47 CFR 22.973 and 47 CFR 90.672 through 47 CFR 90.675. Failure to remedy such interference shall constitute a public nuisance, and the Village may terminate a

- permit for a small wireless facility based on such interference if the wireless provider does not comply with said provisions.
- d. The wireless provider shall not collocate any small wireless facilities on Village utility poles which constitute a part of a municipal electric distribution or transmission system within the communication worker safety zone of the pole or the electric supply zone of the pole, except that the antenna and support equipment of the small wireless facility may be located in the communications space on the Village utility pole and on the top of the pole, if not otherwise unavailable, if the wireless provider complies with applicable codes for work involving the top of the pole.
- g. For purposes of this sub-section,, the terms "communications space", "communication worker safety zone", and "electric supply zone" have the meanings given to those terms in the National Electric Safety Code as published by the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers.
- 4. Safety Regulations. The wireless provider shall comply with all applicable codes and local code provisions or regulations that concern public safety.
- 5. Written Design Standards. The wireless provider shall comply with any written design standards that are generally applicable for decorative utility poles, and with any reasonable stealth, concealment and aesthetic requirements that are set forth in a Village ordinance, a written policy adopted by the Village, a comprehensive plan, or any other written design plan that applies to other occupiers of the rights-of-way, including on a historic landmark or in a historic district.
- 6. Alternate Placements. Except as provided in this Article, a wireless provider shall not be required to collocate small wireless facilities on any specific utility pole, or category of utility poles, or be required to collocate multiple antenna systems on a single utility pole.
 - a. However, with respect to an application for the collocation of a small wireless facility associated with a new utility pole, the Village may propose that the small wireless facility be collocated on an existing utility pole or existing wireless support structure within 100 feet of the proposed collocation, which the applicant shall accept if it has the right to use the alternate structure on reasonable terms and conditions, and the alternate location and structure does not impose technical limits or additional material costs as determined by the applicant.
 - b. If the applicant refuses or declines an alternative placement for a collocation proposed by the Village, the applicant shall provide written certification describing the particular property rights, technical limits, or material costs by which the the proposed alternate placement does not satisfy the criteria in this Article.

7. Height Limitations.

- a. The maximum height of a small wireless facility shall be no more than 10 feet above the utility pole or wireless support structure on which the small wireless facility will be collocated.
- b. New or replacement utility poles or wireless support structures on which small wireless facilities are collocated may not exceed the higher of:

- i) 10 feet in height above the tallest existing utility pole, other than a utility pole supporting only wireless facilities, that is in place on the date the application is submitted to the Village, that is located within 300 feet of the new or replacement utility pole or wireless support structure and that is in the same right-of-way within the jurisdictional boundary of the Village, provided the Village may designate which intersecting right-of-way within 300 feet of the proposed utility pole or wireless support structures shall control the height limitation for such facility; or
- ii) 45 feet above ground level.
- 8. Height / Waiver or Exception. If an applicant proposes a height for a new or replacement pole on which the small wireless facility is proposed for collocation, in excess of the height limitations set forth in this Article, the applicant shall in writing request a waiver or exception of the height limitation; and such request for waiver or exception shall be reviewed, and approved or denied, by the Corporate Authorities.
- 9. Contractual Design Requirements. The wireless provider shall comply with requirements that are imposed by any agreement between the Village and a private property owner that concern design or construction standards applicable to utility poles and ground-mounted equipment located in the right-of-way.
- 10. Ground-mounted Equipment Spacing. The wireless provider shall comply with the spacing requirements in any applicable codes, regulations or ordinances concerning the location of ground-mounted equipment located in the right-of-way, but only if the requirements include a process for waiver or exception to address a request by a wireless provider for waiver or exception and do not prohibit granting such waiver or exception.
- 11. Undergrounding Regulations. The wireless provider shall comply with local code provisions or regulations concerning undergrounding requirements that prohibit the installation of new utility poles, or the modification of existing utility poles, in a right-of-way without prior approval but only if the requirements do not prohibit the replacement of utility poles and include a process for waiver or exception to address request by a wireless provider to install such new utility poles or modify such existing utility poles.
- 12. Collocation Completion Deadline. Collocation for which a permit has been granted by the Village shall be completed within 180 days after issuance of the permit, unless i) the Village and the wireless provider agree to extend this period or ii) a delay is caused by makeready work for a municipal utility pole or by the lack of commercial power or backhaul availability at the site, provided the wireless provider has made a timely request within 60 days after the issuance of the permit for commercial power or backhaul services, and the additional time to complete installation does not exceed 360 days after issuance of the permit. Otherwise, the permit shall expire at the end of 180 days after issuance, unless the Village grants an extension to the applicant, in writing.
- H. Application Fees. Application fees are imposed, and shall be paid by applicant, as follows:
 - 1. \$650 for an application to collocate a single small wireless facility on an existing utility pole or wireless support structure, and \$350 for each small wireless facility addressed in a

consolidated application to collocate more than one small wireless facility on existing utility poles or wireless support structures.

- 2, \$1,000 for each small wireless facility addressed in an application that includes the installation of a new utility pole for such collocation.
- 3. Notwithstanding any contrary provision of State law or local ordinance, to be complete, applications filed with the Village pursuant to this Section shall be accompanied by the required application fee, and the application fee shall be non-refundable.
- 4. The Village shall not require an application, approval or permit, or require any fees or other charges, from a communications service provider authorized to occupy the rights-of-way, for:
 - a. routine maintenance;
 - b. the replacement of wireless facilities with wireless facilities that are substantially similar, the same size, or smaller if the wireless provider notifies the Village at least 10 days prior to the planned replacement and includes equipment specifications for the replacement of equipment consistent with subsection d. under the Section titled Application Requirements; or
 - c. the installation, placement, maintenance, operation or replacement of micro wireless facilities suspended on cables that are strung between existing utility poles in compliance with applicable safety codes.
- 5. Wireless providers shall secure any other permit from the Village required to work within rights-of-way for activities that affect traffic patterns or require lane closures.
- I. Annual Recurring Rate. A wireless provider shall pay to the Village an annual recurring rate to collocate a small wireless facility on a Village utility pole located in a right-of-way that equals the greater of (i) \$200 per year per facility, or (ii) the actual, direct and reasonable costs related to the wireless provider's use of space on the Village utility pole. Provided, if the Village has not otherwise billed the wireless provider actual and direct costs, the fee shall be \$200 payable on the first day after the first annual anniversary date of the issuance of the permit or notice of intent to collocate, and on each annual anniversary date thereafter.
- **J.** Abandonment. A small wireless facility that is not operated for a continuous period of 12 months shall be considered abandoned. The owner of the facility shall remove the small wireless facility within 90 days after receipt of written notice from the Village notifying the wireless provider of the abandonment.
 - The notice shall be sent by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, by the Village to
 the owner at the last known address of the wireless provider. If the small wireless facility is not
 removed within 90 days of such notice, the Village may remove or cause the removal of such
 facility pursuant to the terms of its pole attachment agreement for municipal utility poles or
 through whatever actions are provided for abatement of nuisances or by other law for removal
 and cost recovery.

- 2. A wireless provider shall provide written notice to the Village if it sells or transfers small wireless facilities within the jurisdiction of the Village. Such notice shall include the name and contact information of the new wireless provider.
- **9-11-4. Dispute Resolution.** The Circuit Court of Kane County, Illinois shall have exclusive jurisdiction to resolve all disputes arising under this Article, the Village Code, and/or the Act. Pending resolution of a dispute concerning rates for collocation of small wireless facilities on municipal utility poles within the right-of-way, the Village shall allow the collocating person to collocate on its poles at annual rates of no more than \$200 per year per municipal utility pole, subject to adjustment of the rate as determined upon final resolution of the dispute.
- 9-11-5. Indemnification. A wireless provider shall indemnify and hold the Village harmless against any and all liability or loss from personal injury or property damage resulting from or arising out of, in whole or in part, the use or occupancy of the Village improvements or right-of-way associated with such improvements by the wireless provider or its employees, agents, or contractors arising out of the rights and privileges granted under this Article and the Act. A wireless provider has no obligation to indemnify or hold harmless against any liabilities and losses which may be due to or caused by the sole negligence of the Village or its employees or agents. A wireless provider shall further waive any claims that it may have against the Village with respect to consequential, incidental, or special damages, however caused, based on the theory of liability.

9-11-1 6. Insurance.

- **A.** Coverage. The wireless provider shall carry, at the wireless provider's own cost and expense, the following minimum insurance: Either or both of
 - (i) property insurance for its property's replacement cost against all risks;
 - (ii) workers' compensation insurance, as required by law;
 - or (iii) commercial general liability insurance with respect to its activities on the Village improvements or rights-of-way to afford minimum protection limits consistent with its requirements of other users of Village improvements or rights-of-way, including coverage for bodily injury and property damage.
- **B.** Additional Insured; Documentation. The wireless provider shall include the Village as an additional insured on any commercial general liability policy for the coverage required by this section, and shall file with the Village Clerk certification and documentation of inclusion of the Village in a commercial general liability policy prior to the collocation of any wireless facility.
- C. Self-Insurance. A wireless provider may self-insure all or a portion of the insurance coverage and limit requirement required by the Village.
 - 1. A wireless provider that self-insures is not required, to the extent of the self-insurance, to comply with the requirement of naming additional insureds under this Section.
 - A wireless provider that elects to self-insure shall provide to the Village evidence sufficient to demonstrate its financial ability to self-insure for the insurance coverage limits required by the Village.

Small Cell Facilities Deployment Act (PA 100-0585)

The Illinois General Assembly has recently enacted PA 100-0585, the Small Cell Facilities Deployment Act, effective June 1, 2018. The Act will enable service providers to access municipal utility poles for collocation of small wireless facilities throughout the State of Illinois. ¹

The stated purpose of the enactment is to "specify how local authorities may regulate the collocation of small wireless facilities," by a "fair and predictable process" because such facilities are critical to delivering wireless services throughout the state.

A "small wireless facility" is defined in the Act as "a wireless facility that meets the following qualifications:

- (i) each antenna is located inside an enclosure of no more than 6 cubic feet in volume; or
- (ii) in the case of an antenna that has exposed elements, the antenna and all of its exposed elements could fit within an imaginary enclosure of no more than 6 cubic feet; and
- (ii) all other wireless equipment attached directly to a utility pole associated with the facility is cumulatively no more than 25 cubic feet in volume." 2

The maximum height of any SWF is limited to 10 feet above the top of an existing pole; and the maximum height of a new or replacement pole is 45 feet (or, 10 feet above other nearby poles).

An SWF located either in any ROW, or in any commercial or industrial zoning district (outside of the ROW) -- within these height limitations -- may not be subjected to zoning review or approval ³ The Act allows a local municipality to impose fees for use of municipal poles, as follows:

These new regulations would supplant the regulations enacted in 2017 to govern "Personal Wireless Telecommunications Facilities" under which the Agreement with Mobilitie was then subsequently entered into.

² Certain enumerated types of "associated ancillary equipment" are not be to measured for purposes of calculation these volume restrictions.

³ Note: The Act requires that there be a process for review and approval of exceptions to the height restrictions for new or replacement poles; it is proposed in the draft ordinance that any such request be determined by the Corporate Authorities.

1. Application fee

- a. \$650 for an application to collocate a single small wireless facility on an existing utility pole or wireless support structure,
- b. \$350 for each small wireless facility addressed in a consolidated application to collocate more than one small wireless facility on existing utility poles or wireless support structures.
- c. \$1,000 for each small wireless facility addressed in an application that includes the installation of a new utility pole for such collocation.
- 2. Annual renewal fee of the greater of (i) \$200 per year or (ii) the actual, direct and reasonable costs related to the wireless provider's use of space on Village utility poles.

Action(s) Needed

- A. In order to be enabled to charge application and renewal fees to providers, the Village must take action not later than August 1, 2018 (within two months after the effective date) to establish a fee schedule consistent with the Act.
- B. The Board might also wish to consider adopting additional policies or regulations for reserving space for public safety communications; written design standards; and/or stealth or concealment standards.

Parking Regulations / Fines

The Village Finance Committee has recently recommended that the fines for parking violations in the Village be increased, to \$35.00 (if paid within ten days) and to \$75.00 (if not so paid). The structure also allows for imposition of court costs (currently, \$198.00 per case, for an ordinance violation) against an offender for which municipal court proceedings are required to enforce collection.

In reviewing the parking regulations, it was also determined that some clarity could be added by reiterating the sections in a slightly different order.

Hence, an Ordinance to amend the regulations governing, and the fine amounts for violation of, the Village's parking regulations has been proposed. The ordinance would change the fines for violation, and to re-state the parking regulations (in relation to residential areas vis-à-vis business areas; identifying certain 30-minutes spots, and handicapped parking spaces; and rules for semitrailers and tractors).

If approved, the new fines would be implemented as of July 30, 2018.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE REGULATIONS GOVERNING AND FINES FOR VIOLATION OF THE VILLAGE PARKING REGULATIONS

WHEREAS, the Village has prescribed certain parking regulations in the Village, including a schedule of fine amounts due as a result of any such violation; and

WHEREAS, the Village Finance Committee has recommended that the fine amounts for violation of the Village's parking regulations be increased, and that the fine due be set at \$35.00 for any violation, if paid within 10 days of the date of issuance of a citation for such violation; and at \$75.00, plus court costs, if not so paid.

WHEREAS, the regulations have been re-written to add clarity to the provisions of Article VI; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have considered the recommendation of the Finance Committee, and have determined it to be in the best interests of the welfare and safety of the community to increase said fines.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF HAMPSHIRE, KANE COUNTY, ILLINOIS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Hampshire Municipal Code of 1985, as amended, shall be and hereby is further amended to modify the regulations governing, and the amounts of fines to be paid for violation of, the Village parking regulations, as follows:

See attached text of Chapter 2: Police Regulations, Article VI: Parking Regulations, adopted by this Ordinance

- Section 2. Any and all ordinances, resolutions, motions, or parts thereof, in conflict with this Ordinance, are to the extent of such conflict hereby superseded and waived.
- Section 3. If any section, sentence, subdivision, or phrase of this Ordinance, shall be held to be void, invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.
- Section 4. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form, according to law.

[2-6-1: NO PARKING PLACES - no changes]

2-6-2: DEFINITIONS: For purposes of these regulations:

CLASS D OR HIGHER: Class D, class E, class F and so on, as defined in the Illinois vehicle code.

COMMERCIAL VEHICLE: Defined as set forth in the Illinois motor vehicle code, section 1-111.8, 625 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/1-111.8, as now stated and as may be hereafter modified or amended from time to time, any of which modifications or amendments to be incorporated herein by this reference.

2-6-3: RESTRICTED PARKING IN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS:

- A. In a residential district in the Village, it shall be unlawful to stop, stand or park any commercial vehicle with a Class D registration or higher upon any public street or roadway for a period in excess of sixty (60) minutes, except that this prohibition shall not apply to any commercial vehicle stopped, standing or parked in an alley when which is used for loading and unloading from such vehicle; and except for any public utility or emergency vehicle while engaged in a lawful purpose within said residential district.
- B. It shall be unlawful to stop, stand or park any semi-trailer or tractor on any public or private property in a residential zoning district; except as follows:
 - 1. When said truck or tractor is actually delivering, unloading or loading personal property to or from premises located in such residential zoning district;
 - 2. When parked wholly inside any lawful structure; or
 - 3. For emergency purposes; provided, whenever a semitrailer or tractor is stopped, standing, or parked in an emergency situation, all requirements regarding flares or other warning devices shall be complied with; and the driver or owner shall notify the Police Department of the circumstances as soon as possible.
- C.. A resident may stop, stand or park a travel trailer, camper, recreational vehicle, or boat, or a truck, trailer or moving van on a public right of way or street directly in front of his or her dwelling, for purposes of loading or unloading, for a period not to exceed twenty four (24) hours, unless said parking will cause a danger to public safety. Provided, such resident shall notify the police department prior to stopping, standing or parking such travel trailer, camper, recreational vehicle, or boat, or truck, trailer or moving van pursuant to this subsection.

2-6-4: SEMITRAILERS AND TRACTORS OUTSIDE OF RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS:

A. No trailer used for hauling or storing any construction materials, equipment, apparatus, or any miscellaneous goods, and whether or not attached or detached from a motor vehicle at the time, shall be stopped, left standing, or parked on any public right-of-way, street, parkway, or sidewalk, between the hours of seven o'clock (7:00) P.M. and six o'clock (6:00) A.M. the following day.

2-6-5: PARKING ON PAVED SURFACE. No person shall stop, stand, or park any motor vehicle, trailer, camper, recreational vehicle, or boat, on any grass, dirt, parkway or similar natural surface; but all such vehicles shall be stopped, left standing, or parked at all times on a paved surface.

2-6-6: PROHIBITED AND RESTRICTED PARKING OF CERTAIN MOTOR VEHICLES:

- A. It shall be unlawful to use any public parking location in any business zoning district in the village, whether street side parking or public parking lot, for the parking and/or storage of motor vehicles for commercial purposes.
 - 1. Any owner, proprietor, officer or partner in a commercial enterprise who shall use public parking spaces or lots whether street side or in public parking areas for such commercial purposes for more than three (3) hours, between the hours of eight o'clock (8:00) A.M. and six o'clock (6:00) P.M., except on Sundays and holidays, shall be subject to fine and penalty pursuant to section 2-6-6 of this article.
 - 2. Said offense shall occur when any such vehicle shall remain in a public parking space or public parking lot, whether street side or in a public parking area, for more than three (3) hours during said times without then being removed to a private property for storage.
 - 3. It is the intention of this section to prohibit the commercial use of public parking spaces, whether or not said vehicles shall be moved from one public parking space to another, for any period longer than three (3) hours during said times.
 - 4. After the expiration of three (3) hours, said offense shall be deemed to have been committed, and each day said offense continues beyond the initial offense shall be deemed a complete and separate offense under the terms of the penalty provisions of section 1-6-6 of this article.
- B. Except as otherwise specified in this subsection, there shall be and hereby is established a limit equal to three (3) hours for parking of any and all vehicles on both sides of State Street from Jackson Avenue north to the Hampshire Creek. This limit shall apply at all times between the hours of eight o'clock (8:00) A.M. to six o'clock (6:00) P.M., Monday through Saturday; provided
 - 1. Two (2) parking spaces otherwise designated for parking in the 100 block of State Street shall each be subject to a limit of thirty (30) minutes; and two (2) spaces otherwise designated for parking in the 200 block of State Street shall also each be subject to a limit of thirty (30) minutes. These spaces shall be located one on each side of the street, and shall be marked by appropriate signs.
 - 2. The first designated parking space on the east side of North State Street, immediately south of Keyes Avenue, address at 193 North State Street, shall be subject to a limit of thirty (30) minutes. Said restriction shall be in effect between the hours of seven o'clock (7:00) A.M. and eight o'clock (8:00) P.M. each day of the week, except Sundays and holidays.
- E. The first designated parking space on the north side of West Jefferson Street, immediately west of South State Street, shall be subject to a limit of fifteen (15) minutes. Said restriction shall be

in effect between the hours of seven o'clock (7:00) A.M. and eight o'clock (8:00) P.M. each day of the week, except Sundays and holidays.

- F. It shall be unlawful to use any public parking lot located in any business or industrial zoning district in the village, except in the highway commercial zoning district, for the parking and/or storage of a motor vehicle bearing registration of class C or higher class, or the parking and/or storage of any truck trailer, for any purpose.
- D. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle in any public parking lot located in the village for a period in excess of seventy two (72) hours.
- 2-6-7: ANGLE PARKING: It shall be unlawful to park any motor vehicle in a designated angled parking space, which is neither parallel nor perpendicular to the curb, by backing said vehicle into the angled parking space.

2-6-8: UNAUTHORIZED USE OF PARKING PLACES RESERVED FOR HANDICAPPED PERSONS:

- A. No person shall park any motor vehicle which is not bearing registration plates issued to a physically handicapped person pursuant to 625 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/3-616, or to a disabled veteran pursuant to 625 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/3-609, or is not bearing a handicapped motorist decal or device issued by a local governing authority pursuant to 625 Illinois Compiled Statutes 5/11-1301.2, in any parking place, including any private or public off street parking facility, specifically reserved, by posting of an official sign, for motor vehicles bearing such registration plates or decal.
- B. The following parking places shall be designated, by posting an official sign, parking places reserved for handicapped persons, and shall be specifically reserved for parking of motor vehicles bearing registration plates or decals described in this section:
 - 1. The southernmost parking place on the east side of South State Street at the northeast corner of its intersection with Jefferson Street.
 - 2. The northernmost parking place on the west side of South State Street at the southwest corner of its intersection with Washington Street.
 - 3. The easternmost parking place on the north side of the municipal parking lot at the intersection of Park Street and Rinn Street.

2-6-9: PENALTY FOR PARKING VIOLATIONS:

- A. For any offense other than a violation of section 2-6-5, "Unauthorized Use of Parking Places Reserved for Handicapped Persons,"
 - 1. The owner of the vehicle or the person receiving the citation may settle and compromise the claim against him or her for such illegal parking by paying to the village, not later than ten (10) days after the date of issuance of the citation, the sum of thirty five dollars (\$35.00) for compromise and settlement of the alleged violation; and

- 2. If the citation has not been compromised and settled by the village's receipt of such payment within ten (10) days after the date of issuance of the citation, then the fine for such violation shall be seventy five dollars (\$75.00); and the village may institute proceedings on said citation against the owner of the vehicle in the circuit court at any time after said ten (10) days, in which case court costs shall be added to the fine.
- B. For an offense under section 2-6-5, "Unauthorized Use of Parking Places Reserved for Handicapped Persons,"
 - 1. The owner of the vehicle or the person receiving the citation shall be liable for a fine equal to Three Hundred Fifty dollars (\$350.00), which fine shall be paid within ten (10) days of the date of issuance of the citation; and
 - 2. If said fine has not been paid within ten (10) days after the date of issuance of said citation, the village may institute proceedings on said citation against the owner of the vehicle in the circuit court at any time after said ten (10) days, in which case court costs shall be added to the fine.
